NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that due to the resignation of a Councillor and no request to run an election, the vacancy will now be filled by co-option.

The Parish Council intends to co-opt to fill this vacancy at the next meeting on Tuesday 22nd July 2014, and invites interested persons to write to the Clerk to the Council by Friday 18th July 2014, formally declaring their willingness to be co-opted and stating why they wish to be considered.

To be eligible candidates must be aged 18 or older, and must in addition either

- Be on the Electoral Roll of the Parish, or
- During the whole of the past 12 months have either lived in the Parish, owned or leased land in the Parish, worked in the Parish, or lived within 3 miles of it.

Candidates will be invited to the Council meeting at 7.45pm on Tuesday 22nd July and asked to address Council for not more than 5 minutes. Following all the addresses, Council will make a resolution co-opting the successful candidate, who will be required to sign a Declaration of Acceptance of Office and Register of Interests immediately and join the meeting as a Councillor.

The successful candidate will serve until the next Election.

What is a Parish Council and why become a Parish Councillor?

What is a Parish Council?

A parish council is a local authority that makes decisions on behalf of the people in the parish. It is the level government closest to the community, with the district authority (Cotswold District Council) above it in the hierarchy.

As it is the authority closest to the people, parish councils are invariably the first place people will go with concerns or ideas. For this reason they are a vital part of any community.

Why become a Parish Councillor?

If you've never been to a parish council meeting before, you may be forgiven for thinking that parish councillors are a group of (probably older) people who meet now and then in a draughty village hall. If, however, you live in a community where something 'big' has happened, you'll know that when people in the community need support and guidance, it is sometimes the parish council that is turned to.

By becoming a parish councillor you become someone your community will look to for help, guidance and support ? a community leader with the power to influence decisions for the benefit of the people you serve. Seeing your community change for the better, as a result of decisions you have helped make, is something that can give you a sense of achievement and pride.

What decisions do Parish Councils make?

Parish councils make all kinds of decisions on issues that affect the local community. Probably the most common topics that parish councils get involved with are planning matters (they are statutory consultees), crime prevention, managing open spaces and campaigning for and delivering better services and facilities.

It's true to say that on their own, parish councils have limited powers to make decisions. But they do have the ability to negotiate with, and the power to influence, those other organisations that do make the final decisions (such as the borough council, health authorities, police etc).

In this respect parish councils are extremely powerful. The organisations that make the final decisions know that a parish council gives the best reflection of how a community feels about something, and its views will be taken seriously.

How much time does it take up?

Councils usually meet once a month for the council meeting, to which members of the public are also invited. Meetings may last one or two hours, depending on the agenda set for the meeting to discuss. Some councils have committees to deal with specific subjects, such as environmental issues. In addition to the regular meetings, councillors are required to attend other meeting representing the council. ? for example acting as a representative on an outside body, community activities or helping develop a new project for the community. Such meetings won't happen every day, so it's not going to take over your life.

How long does a parish councillor serve for?

Once elected, parish councillors sit on the council for a maximum of four years. If they then want to stay in the post they can stand for re-election.

Am I eligible to be a Parish Councillor?

To stand for election on a parish council, you must:

- * be a UK or commonwealth citizen, or;
- * be a citizen of the Republic of Ireland, or;
- * be a citizen of another Member state of the European Union;
- * be a least 18 years old.

To be eligible to stand for an election for a particular parish, you must:

- * be an elector of the parish, or;
- * for the whole of the previous 12 months have occupied (as owner or tenant) land or other premises in the parish, or;
- * during the previous 12 months have worked in the parish (as your principal or only place of work), or;
- * for the whole of the previous 12 months lived in the parish or within three miles of the parish boundary.

You don't have to be connected to a political party.

If you do become a parish councillor you will have to sign up to the Code of Conduct.

What powers do parish councils have?

They have a wide range of powers which essentially related to local matters, such as looking after community buildings, open space, allotments, play areas, street lighting, bus shelters, car parks and much more. The council also has the power to raise money through taxation, the precept. The precept is the parish council's share of the council tax. The precept demand goes to the billing authority, the district council, which collects the tax for the parish council.

Parish Duties

Kempsford Parish Council has 7 Councillors who stand for election every four years. The duties and functions of a parish council are many and varied.

The Council meets monthly and considers planning applications and any other matters referred to it by local residents, Cotswold District Council, Gloucestershire County Council and by central government. All meetings are open to the public and there is a forum before the start of the meeting at which members of the public can raise concerns and ask questions. There is also an annual meeting which all parishioners are invited to attend. All meetings are advertised on the council notice boards and website. Residents can bring to the attention of the parish council anything that concerns them, either directly or though the clerk. If matters raised are not the responsibility of the council, the clerk can bring them to the attention of the proper authority.

Don't take our word for it!

The best way to find out what it's like to be a parish councillor is to talk to someone who's doing it now. Come along to a parish council meeting, or speak to one of our councillors and find out what they think of the job.

Meeting the Challenge – Together we can

Four years ago we launched Meeting the Challenge, which was our plan to save £114million. The good news is that we're on track to make the savings we need by the end of this financial year.

But that's not the end of the story. We're about to start work on our next financial challenge and we need your views on what we're planning. But first, it's important that you understand the journey we have been on.

In the 1940s and 50s, it was the norm for people to turn to their families, friends and communities when they needed support. Over the years, things gradually changed and today people now see the council as the first port of call and we have more customers than ever. Healthcare has improved so people with complex problems are living longer needing ongoing support. Couple that with a continued reduction in our funding and we start to see a growing gap between what people expect us to do and what we can actually afford – a gap of around £25million per year.

What we're looking at is a fundamental change in our approach to supporting people. We need to go back to the days where communities were stronger and people looked out for each other in their own neighbourhoods so we can protect the most vulnerable.

We know there are already excellent community networks and groups running and we want to work with them, share their local knowledge and invest where we think something can be developed further to help individuals and families.

We're proposing a four-stage approach to providing support:

• **Creating active individuals:** intervention and support to help people make the right life choices, like being fit and healthy. Providing support for people to do more for themselves and their families in their own communities

• **Creating active communities:** communities offering support closer to home. Investing in community capacity and building on existing support to signpost people to what they need within their own communities

• **Getting people back to independence:** investing in providing intensive packages of support that focus on a quick recovery following an injury or trauma. We want to enable people to get back to normal as soon as possible to reduce the need for long term care

• **There when we're needed most:** working with our partners to provide specialist, acute support for those who really need our help. We will target this care to people with complex needs and help them to make decisions about the long term care that is right for them

Gloucestershire Minerals Local Plan Site Options and Draft Policy Framework Consultation — Seeking your views

This consultation is the next step in Gloucestershire County Council producing a new Minerals Plan to 2030.

It was clear from the Parish Plan survey evidence that quarrying and the impact it has, is very important to many residents.

The consultation documents cover a range of areas such as site options for mineral extraction, allocation of mineral safeguarding areas and draft policies which could be used for the determination of planning applications. It is stressed that no decisions have been taken as yet as to which site options should be taken forward into the plan as preferred site allocations.

The National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) requires Gloucestershire to maintain a rolling landbank of 7 years permitted reserves for sand & gravel throughout the plan period. Based on average sales figures over 10 years, the provision requirements up to 2030 = 14.94 million tonnes, plus 5.81 million tonnes as a 7 year landbank at the end of 2030. This means a total of 20.75 million tonnes of sand and gravel resources need to be provided for through the Mineral Local Plan.

Historically around 95-98% of the sand and gravel produced in the county has been extracted from the Cotswold Water Park in the Upper Thames Valley. Included in this consultation, 8 out of the 10 site areas presented as options for future sand and gravel are within the Upper Thames Valley. On the next few pages is sites presented as options for potential allocations for sand and gravel within Kempsford Parish.

There are other sites presented at Horcott and Down Ampney, which although are outside the Parish, may impact on Kempsford Parish in terms of HGV traffic for example. Further details on these site is contained within the consultation documents.

The consultation begins on 23rd June 2014 and runs until 18th August 2014.



Site description:	The site is located close to RAF Fairford in the Cotswold Water Park. All parcels fall within the parish of Kempsford. The site comprises several parcels of land, all of which were previously allocated as preferred areas in the 2003 MLP. The majority of the proposed areas outlined above could be worked as potential extensions to the existing Manor Farm Quarry site which is located adjacent to RAF Fairford and accessed via Washpool Lane. Most of the parcels are relatively flat farmland punctuated with mature treelines/woodland, watercourses/drainage ditches and the occasional old building. Area D contains landing lights for RAF Fairford. Area C has been promoted by the mineral operator and has been subject to an EIA scoping opinion and the subsequent planning application was submitted in early 2014. Area A is a small area which was adjacent to the former Stubbs Farm Quarry (now in restoration). It is a relatively small parcel of agricultural land. Area B is located the opposite side of Washpool Lane to Manor Farm and is currently used for agricultural purposes. Area C is the area which the operator of Manor Farm has proposed as a preferred extension area. It consists of relatively flat arable land with some mature hedgerows and drainage ditches. There is an old barn within the area, but the applicant has indicated it would be excluded from the forthcoming application. The applicant has also indicated that the mature black poplars would be retained as part of the same application. Area D is currently leased to the MOD, it is a relatively flat arable field and contains landing lights used in association with the runway at RAF Fairford. Area E consists of predominantly pastureland and is separated from Area F by the River Coln. Nearby uses include a converted barn now used as a wedding venue. Area F consists of a mixture of agricultural land and planted woodland north of the River Coln. It was part of the Preferred Area for Kempsford/Whelford in the adopted MLP (2003) and was envisaged as a possible ext

The small size of the site may also mean that it is potentially unviable. Parcel B – Although it is a residual parcel of a larger unworked preferred area, there has been no landowner or mineral operator interest received so far in this process, meaning that the potential deliverability of the parcel is questionable. Parcel C – There is known operator interest on this parcel and a recently submitted planning application for 3.2mt. It is therefore potentially the most deliverable parcel in the area. Overall Parcel C may come forward in the early stage of the plan-period. Subject to planning permission being obtained, other unconstrained and economically viable parcels of land also need to be considered as potentially contributing in the plan-period. Parcel D currently contains lighting associated with the runway at RAF Fairford which could impact upon the potential deliverability of this parcel.
	Parcels E and F - Although the parcels are residual parts of the larger unworked preferred area, the proximity of the River Coln and Jenner's Farm field might impact upon the potential quantity of sand and gravel resources available in these areas. The operator of Thornhill Farm/Coln Quarry is no longer interested in parcel E therefore this site might not be able to contribute until the latter part of the plan period.
	Generally applicable to all parcels The parcels are all existing preferred areas there are already reasonable distances between potential working areas and sensitive properties and uses. However there would still be issues to consider carefully at any potential application stage. It should be noted that these potential land allocations avoid the Upper Thames Valley village settlement protection zones of Kempsford and Whelford. Highways –It is anticipated that any parcels coming forward would
	be as an extension to existing operations and unlikely to increase existing road movements. Existing access and infrastructure are significant advantages. However, a transport assessment would still be required.

Public Rights of Way may be affected.
Ecology/biodiversity – there are nearby wildlife sites which would need to be considered in terms of both as a constraint an in restoration opportunities.
Archaeology – the entire site is located with an area of known archaeological interest.
There is a large percentage of known best and most versatile agricultural land to be considered.
MoD – due to the close proximity of RAF Fairford, birdstrike is an issue that needs considering as would the proximity to bomb storage facilities. Water-based restoration could be an issue with regards to birdstrike.
Flooding – there are flooding and water management issues to be considered on the site. There may be opportunities to manage or enhance flood water capacity. The restoration methods may require careful consideration particularly if there is importation of inert materials. There will be a significant issue to reconcile both floodrisk and birdstrike issues through restoration design.

RAF Fairford activity July 2014

RAF Fairford is home to the USAF 420th Air Base Squadron, which is part of the 501st Combat Support Wing at RAF Alconbury in Cambridgeshire. The base is maintained in a ready, "warm status" by a civilian workforce who are responsible for all daily tasks and contingency preparations.

The main mission at RAF Fairford is to be ready to receive a deployment of aircraft and personnel with 48 hours' notice, both for real-world scenarios and for training.

Following the recent exercise on base, the airfield at RAF Fairford remains busy during the month of July. The main activity will be the Royal International Air Tattoo, and the airfield will once again be handed over to the RAF Charitable Trust for a short period, in order to run this event over the weekend of 11th to 13th July.

One of the star attractions at this year's Air Tattoo is the new F-35 Lightning II aircraft, which will be conducting a limited number of flying operations from RAF Fairford throughout the month of July, in support of both the Royal International Air Tattoo, and Farnborough Air Show the following weekend. It is also expected that there will be other aircraft staying at RAF Fairford following RIAT to support the Farnborough Air Show.

At the end of July, the USAF 352nd Special Operations Group (SOG) will be conducting an exercise at Fairford during the last week of the month. This exercise will involve the CV-22 Osprey and C-130 Hercules aircraft, and up to 200 military personnel on base. The 352nd SOG is based at RAF Mildenhall in Suffolk, England. The 352nd SOG unit plans and executes specialised and contingency operations using advanced aircraft, tactics and air refueling techniques to transport and resupply military forces. The exercise is not based on any current or real-world events.

We hope that activities at RAF Fairford are not too intrusive to local residents, and ask that residents are not alarmed by the military operations at RAF Fairford during this time.



raft building, aeroball, disc golf, body zorbing and lots of teamwork and problem solving had to be achieved.



Bin it, don't Block it



Leftover cooking fat and oil poured down the sink will set hard. This creates stinking, pipe-blocking fatbergs beneath your house or in your street.

Wet wipes are another big no-no because they are made of plastic. They don't break down like toilet tissue, clinging to fat and clogging up the system. If drains get blocked, what you flush can come back up through your toilet or even your sink.

At Thames Water, we clear around 55,000 blockages from our sewers each year at a cost of £12m and 7,000 customers suffer from sewer flooding in their homes and gardens – a truly miserable experience.

To flush, or not to flush?

The drains connected to your home were not designed to cope with anything other than wastewater, toilet tissue and human waste.

Even the products labelled 'flushable' do not break down in the sewer. Flushing them could block your internal plumbing or the main sewer, causing sewage to back-up.

The message is simple, if it's not water, toilet tissue or poo, please... bin it - don't block it.

Thousands of unsuitable products are washed down the drain each year contributing to around 55,000 blockages across the Thames Water region.

This is made worse by confusing and misleading product labelling, which encourages customers to flush unsuitable items, particularly toddler wipes and sanitary items. Although these items disappear when you flush your loo, they can take a number of years to break down. There are currently no restrictions in place to prevent these products being sold as 'flushable'.

The only product to pass water industry 'flushability' tests so far is toilet paper. Manufacturers have their own tests, which are more lenient resulting in a greater number of products being labelled 'flushable'.
