


Kempsford Brownies is going from strength to strength, having doubled our numbers since July, we are proud to have 17 girls now.

November

Autumn is in full flow and the leaves will soon start to fall gently down. The last of the apples are in crumbles in the freezer and my damson gin is distilling in the Kilner jars. (This is not entirely a peaceful country idyll however - am I the only one hiding under the bed when the bombers thunder overhead?!) Our peace of mind can be disturbed by the fuel shortages, driver shortages, and Christmas shortages, but the repeatable cycle of nature reminds us that life still goes on as the seasons change – there is abundance in the fields and wildlife find plenty to store away for their hibernation.

The Bible tells us that God always feeds the birds and will also provide for our needs too.

I suppose there's a difference between our needs and our wants! Perhaps the shortage of items will help us reduce our consumption and lists of wants in favour of *a* simpler way of life, now that all the extras are not so readily available. Reducing our consumption is one way of allowing our planet to breathe, to recover herself as we take less, produce less and waste less.

I'm sure all of us are thinking of ways to help reduce our carbon footprint - at home, at work, at school and at church we are hopefully doing what we can to use less energy and water, and certainly less plastic in every area of life. We are working with our school and parish council on ideas to make our village greener, and we need to reduce the plastic items in our graveyard. They break down and the plastic microfibres get into the water courses, and the solar lights impact nocturnal creatures. We will offer bulbs to be planted on graves instead to have a show of colour all year round. There was a public meeting in October to share these proposals.

It was wonderful to be at the re-opening of the village café in the village hall recently and meet locals and guests from other areas, munching on homemade soup and **bread, enjoying the array of cakes and one another's company. Thanks to every**one who made such a happy atmosphere and drew people together after such a long time apart. Being together is so important for our wellbeing – as of course is cake, one of the major food groups!

November is our month of remembering and everyone is invited to light a candle in memory of their loved ones at a service for All Souls on Monday 1st November at 7pm at the church, and to remember our fallen heroes at a short outdoor service in the graveyard on Remembrance Sunday 14th Nov at 10.45am. CHANGES TO THE GRAVEYARD

As part of our efforts to reduce our environmental impact and improve our green spaces, we need to make some changes in our graveyard at St. Mary's. We need to ask everyone

who has a loved one in the graveyard to take away plastic flowers and ornaments from the graves as they have grown in number and are damaging the environment.

The Diocese of Gloucester sets the regulations for all churchyards in our area and they do not allow any plastic flowers or ornaments – these rules have been in force for a long time and anyone who applies to have a loved one buried or interred in our churchyard has to sign to say they will adhere to them.

However, some people have said they have never been made aware of this and so I list the regulations here (a copy of the full document is in the noticeboard in our church porch and this is found on page 12):

Flowers

- 8.1 Except where the design of a memorial/gravestone includes an integral vessel for plants or cut flowers, flowers may only be placed in a removable container. Wreaths and cut flowers may be placed in such containers or laid on any grave, but must be removed as soon as they appear to be withered or dead.
- 8.2 <u>Artificial flowers are not allowed</u> except for Remembrance Day poppies and <u>traditional</u> Christmas wreaths. They should be removed after no more than two months.
- 8.3 <u>The PCC may</u>, at its discretion, at any time remove <u>and dispose of</u> <u>wreaths, cut flowers or artificial flowers</u> placed in a churchyard <u>if</u> it is considered that, in the PCCs reasonable opinion, they have deteriorated <u>and/or have become unsightly</u>.
- 8.4 Bulbs and small annual plants may be planted in the soil of any grave (but not in any container). However, no trees or shrubs may be planted without the agreement of the PCC and the consent of the Archdeacon.
- 8.5 The PCC may make rules for the location and removal of flowers and a copy of such rules shall be made available both to the family of the deceased before any burial or the interment of cremated remains and should generally be available for perusal in the church porch or other suitable position in the churchyard where they may be freely consulted by members of the public. [These are listed in the noticeboard in the church porch].
- 8.6 <u>A parish priest</u>, churchwarden or whoever is authorised by the PCC to look after the churchyard is permitted to remove unsightly flowers and any <u>items not permitted</u> by these Regulations and any other permitted items if they consider they are not maintained to an acceptable and tidy condition.

8.7 One suitable toy or tribute may be placed on the grave of a child (i.e. a person under 18 years of age) provided that it is removed after a period of six months. <u>No ornaments or additions may be placed on other graves</u> save for flowers or wreaths as provided in this Regulation 7.

Why do we need to make these changes?

- 1. As there was no Vicar in post for 5 years, the number of items on graves has grown and grown. They are harming the environment and look unsightly.
- 2. We are working to care for the environment and the plastic and painted items are very harmful to the land, water and wildlife we share the countryside with. The plastic breaks down and pollutes the land and local streams, and the solar lights at night are harmful to nocturnal creatures.
- 3. A country graveyard, next to a Grade I listed church should look appropriate to its setting; peaceful and natural.
- 4. The church and the parish council have received many complaints from people whose loved ones are in our graveyard and who object to the amount of items on graves. They are adhering to the regulations and wish others to do the same.

Some people have said they do not wish to be buried here themselves because of all the items on the graves. This is a shared public space and everyone must be aware of the impact of their actions upon others.

What are we proposing?

We are asking you to take home personal items, plastic and ceramic items and solar lights from the graves and make a space at home or in your garden for them instead. You can choose one thing to keep on the grave, as long as it is not a solar light of any kind.

In exchange, we will be offering bags of mixed bulbs, free of charge, that can be planted on the graves, so there will be colourful flowers coming out all year round, improving the area for bees and insects, and returning the graveyard to a more natural country environment.

If you are unable to plant bulbs, we have a team of people who are experienced gardeners from the village who will plant them for you, with your permission.

A new group to oversee the graveyard

A group of people from the village have formed to work on improvements to the graveyard. We will be installing a new bench and planting some wildflower areas, aswell as bulbs and plants for bees and insects over the next few months. If you would like to join this group, please contact Mark Strange from our parish council, number on the rear cover of this newsletter.

Aggregate Industries has the safety of the communities it operates in at heart. As such we must stress to those living close to our Manor Farm Quarry site that it is of paramount importance that they stay out of the quarry. Below are just a few examples why:

- Within the site there are steep, hidden holes which can contain deep, cold water which can cause shock and result in drowning. They potentially have unstable sides which can prevent people from escaping them if they fall in
- While the base of the quarry may look sturdy, it may be made of soft clay which can collapse if walked on
- Dangerous quicksand is present within the quarry.
- Trespass at the weekends when there are few or no staff on site might mean there is no help available if required

While we will always look out for our neighbours' safety, it is also important that our neighbours look out for the safety of each other. Warning signs close to the site have recently been vandalised, resulting in the potential hazards being unclear to passers-by, and fences have also been damaged meaning people and animals can access areas where they shouldn't be. We respectfully ask that our neighbours report any vandalism that they see around our site so we can keep the community and our colleagues safe. We thank you for your cooperation, and we look forward to continuing safe operations in the area.

Walk 9: Horcott and River Coln



Distance 2.27mi

Moving Time **1:01:17**

Pace **26:59/mi**

I am getting short of routes to walk now, but I will claim this did at least start in the parish even if I did drive to the start which was by Horcott House (Pic 1). Walk up the farm drive and then turn right and go between some buildings with a house on your left. It does look as if you are going to end up in someone's back garden, but don't panic, you will soon see the





stile into a grassy

field (Pic 2). Follow the path arrows - and there are lots of them tacked onto fence posts and bridges. You will get your first view of the Coln on your left (Pic 3) and Cleeve Wood on your right. If the wood wasn't there you would probably be able to see part of the airbase (the "not the main entrance" side). At the end of the

field take the

bridge and there are some trees to get under (Pic 4), which did bizarrely remind me of the limbo dancing we did on the Kempsford Cricket Club tour all those years ago to the Isle of Wight. Still as they say what happens on tour stays on tour.



If you survive that bit, the territory opens up and you should be able to see another bridge which is a bit more elevated and requires climbing a few steps to get onto. At the end of this you are still under halfway, but sensing victory I went to the right and walked by the imaginatively named Lake 104 (pic 5). Something is happening at this lake (more holiday lodges?) so I soon found the Heras fencing which was open and would have allowed access. For me it was the turn around point, else I couldn't



have got back to the start on footpaths (and would have ended up near the water ski lake).



So having turned around, go effectively straight ahead, and find another bridge on your left. Having crossed that, go right. At this point I met a local who helped me on my way. Of all the walks so far, this is the most people I have met. I think this is possibly encouraged by the buggy/wheelchair friendly accessibility path which we get to after about 3 open fields. Pic 6 shows a sign at the point we join the accessibility path - also instructions on helping the Coln water vole population.

The weather was kind today and I didn't need the gloves I had brought - this was as a result of having cold hands the day before at The Hawthorns, home of West Bromwich Albion. Many of you will know this is the highest football league ground in the country and I should have known better. I digress because on our right is a field of lethargic looking cows who reminded me of the Bristol City defenders as West Brom scythed through their defense for the first goal. Enough rambling on and back to



the excellent made up path that takes you to Dilly's bridge - now a shiny galvanised version in case you haven't been there for a few years. Use this to cross over the Coln. I stopped to talk to a couple of Fairford water vole spotters, no luck today though for them. There was a very friendly cat also looking out so that may explain it. They told me they have seen up to 7 cats on "vole-patrol". Having crossed the bridge turn left and walk back along the Coln with the Fairford Youth Football ground on your right. You will come to a split in the path at a wooden fence. If you take the right hand option it will bring you out by the Catholic church. I took the left option which brings you back to the farm track where you go right to finish the walk. As usual the photos will look better on the KPC website - as well as being in colour!

So a short walk but a pleasant way to spend Sunday afternoon. Richard Caswell
